Indeed, it may produce a strong impact on representations of refugees and their culture, understanding of their problematics and dealing with it.

Members of the European project Erasmus+ project RefugeesIn, cinema for refugees' social inclusion are convinced that today when refugees' and their social inclusion have become one of the major societal issues of the European countries, cinema as well as other media should more often convey images of positive refugees' social inclusion, thus nurturing valuable and productive relationships with representives of the majority populations.

Consequently, it is important that cinema does not vehicle out stereotyped images about exclusively helpless, dependent, ignorant, exploited, isolated and threatened /threatening refugees at the edge of deliquency, replacing them with images more in conformity with social needs, reality and and developments.
